Report on the Financial Statements

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of Greater Hudson Bank, N.A, which comprise the statements of financial condition as of December 31, 2014 and 2013, and the related statements of operations, comprehensive income, changes in shareholders' equity, and cash flows for the years then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

NOTE 1 – SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Organization and Nature of Operations: Greater Hudson Bank, N.A. (the “Bank”), is a full service commercial national bank chartered under the laws of the United States. The Bank provides a full range of banking services to individual and corporate customers located primarily in Orange, Rockland, and Westchester Counties, New York. The Bank is subject to federal and New York statutes applicable to national banks. The Bank’s deposits are insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (“FDIC”) and it is subject to regulation, supervision and examination by the Office of the Comptroller of the Currency (“OCC”) and the FDIC.

Subsequent Events: The Bank has evaluated subsequent events for recognition and disclosure through April 9, 2015, which is the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

Use of Estimates: The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Interest-Rate Risk: The Bank is principally engaged in the business of attracting deposits from the general public and using these deposits, together with other funds, to make loans and to purchase securities. The potential for interest-rate risk exists as a result of the difference in duration of the Bank’s interest-sensitive liabilities compared to its interest-sensitive assets. For this reason, management regularly monitors the maturity structure of the Bank’s interest-earning assets and interest-bearing liabilities in order to measure its level of interest-rate risk and to plan for future volatility.

Significant Group Concentrations of Credit Risk: Most of the Bank’s activities are with customers located within Hudson Valley, New York, and surrounding areas. Note 2 describes the types of securities that the Bank invests in. Note 3 discusses the types of lending that the Bank engages in. Although the Bank has a diversified loan portfolio, its debtors’ ability to honor their contracts is influenced by the region’s economy.

Cash Flows: Cash and cash equivalents include cash, deposits with other financial institutions with maturities fewer than 90 days, and federal funds sold. Net cash flows are reported for customer loan and deposit transactions, interest bearing deposits in other financial institutions, and federal funds purchased and repurchase agreements.

Securities: Debt securities are classified as held to maturity and carried at amortized cost when management has the positive intent and ability to hold them to maturity. Securities to be held for indefinite periods of time and not intended to be held to maturity are classified as available for sale. Securities available for sale include securities that management intends to use as part of its asset/liability management strategy and that may be sold in response to changes in interest rates, resultant prepayment risk and other related factors. Securities available for sale are carried at estimated fair value and unrealized holding gains and losses on such securities are excluded from earnings and reported as increases or decreases in other comprehensive income. Gains and losses on sales of securities are based on the identifiable cost and are accounted for on a trade date basis. The amortization of premiums and accretion of discounts are recognized in interest income using methods approximating the interest method over the period of maturity. Interest and dividend income is recognized when earned.

On a quarterly basis, management makes an assessment to determine whether there have been any events or economic circumstances to indicate that a security on which there is an unrealized loss is impaired on an other-than-temporary basis.

Loss Contingencies: Loss contingencies, including claims and legal actions arising in the ordinary course of business, are recorded as liabilities when the likelihood of loss is probable and an amount or range of loss can be reasonably estimated. Management does not believe there now are such matters that will have a material effect on the financial statements.

Fair Value of Financial Instruments: Fair values of financial instruments are estimated using relevant market information and other assumptions, as more fully disclosed in a separate note. Fair value estimates involve uncertainties and matters of significant judgment regarding interest rates, credit risk, prepayments, and other factors, especially in the absence of broad markets for particular items. Changes in assumptions or in market conditions could significantly affect the estimates.

Loans: Loans receivable that management has the intent and ability to hold for the foreseeable future or payoff are stated at the amount of unpaid principal, less deferred loan fees and the allowance for loan losses. Interest income is accrued on the unpaid principal balance. Loan origination and commitment fees and certain direct loan origination costs are deferred, and the net amount is amortized over the estimated life of the loan on a basis that approximates level yield.

Nonaccrual loans and loans past due 90 days still on accrual include both smaller balance homogeneous loans that are collectively evaluated for impairment and individually classified impaired loans. The accrual of income on loans is generally discontinued when a loan becomes more than 90 days delinquent as to principal or interest or when other circumstances indicate that collection is questionable, unless the loan is well secured and in the process of collection. Income on nonaccrual loans is recognized only in the period in which it is collected, and only if management determines that the loan principal is fully collectible. Loans are returned to an accrual status when a loan is brought current as to principal and interest and reasons for doubtful collection no longer exist. All loan segments are treated consistently in this manner.

Allowance for Loan Losses: The allowance for loan losses is established through provisions for loan losses charged against income. Loans deemed to be uncollectible are charged against the allowance for loan losses, and subsequent recoveries, if any, are credited to the allowance.

The allowance for loan losses is maintained at a level considered adequate to provide for probable incurred losses. Management's periodic evaluation of the adequacy of the allowance is based on the Bank's past loan loss experience, known and inherent risks in the portfolio, adverse situations that may affect the borrower's ability to repay, the estimated value of any underlying collateral, composition of the loan portfolio, current economic conditions, and other relevant factors. This evaluation is inherently subjective, as it requires material estimates that may be susceptible to significant revision as more information becomes available.

In addition, various regulatory agencies, as an integral part of their examination process, periodically review the Bank's allowance for loan losses. Such agencies may require the Bank to recognize additions to the allowance for loan losses based on their judgments about information available to them at the time of their examinations.

The allowance consists of specific and general components. The specific component relates to loans that are classified as impaired, on which an allowance is established when the discounted cash flows, collateral value or observable market price of the impaired loan is lower than the carrying amount of that loan. The general component covers the remainder of the portfolio and is based on historical loss experience adjusted for qualitative factors. The Bank utilizes qualitative adjustments to the allowance for loan losses analysis within parameters. The qualitative adjustments are based on the factors below, which are patterned after the guidelines provided under the FFIEC Interagency Policy Statement on the Allowance for Loan and Lease Losses. If information exists to warrant adjustment to the historical loss experience, changes are made in accordance with parameters supported by narrative and/or statistical analysis.

- Changes in lending policies and procedures, including underwriting standards;
- Changes in collection, charge-off and recovery practices;
- Changes in the nature and volume of the loan portfolio;
- Changes in the experience, ability, and depth of lending management;
- Changes in the volume and severity of past due loans, nonaccrual loans, troubled debt restructurings, and adversely classified loans;
- Changes in the value of underlying collateral for collateral-dependent loans;
- The existence and effect of any concentrations of credit and changes in the level of such concentrations;
- Changes in the quality of our loan review system and the degree of oversight by the Board of Directors;
- Growth in the loan portfolio;
- Changes in the use of peer group net base loss rates to the Bank's net base loss rates;
- Changes in current, national and local economic and business conditions; and
- The effect of other external factors such as competition and legal and regulatory requirements.

The following are the Bank's portfolio segments:

- Commercial Real Estate Loans
- Land Acquisition and Construction Loans
- Other Real Estate Loans
- Commercial Loans
- Consumer Loans

Commercial real estate loans generally have greater credit risks compared to one- to four-family residential mortgage loans, as they typically involve large loan balances concentrated with single borrowers or groups of related borrowers. In addition, the payment experience on loans secured by income-producing properties typically depends on the successful operation of the related real estate project and thus may be subject to a greater extent to adverse conditions in the real estate market and in the general economy.

Land acquisition and construction loans generally have greater credit risk than traditional one-to-four-family residential mortgage loans. The repayment of these loans depends upon the sale of the property to third parties or the availability of permanent financing upon completion of all improvements. In the event the Bank makes a loan on property that is not yet approved for the planned development, there is the risk that approvals will not be granted or will be delayed. These events may adversely affect the borrower and the collateral value of the property. Construction loans also expose the Bank to the risk that improvements will not be completed on time in accordance with specifications and projected costs. In addition, the ultimate sale or rental of the property may not occur as anticipated.

The other real estate segment includes the following classes: one-to four family residential mortgage loans, multifamily real estate loans and home equity loans. One-to four residential mortgage loans and home equity loans have as collateral a borrower's primary residence, second home or investment property. The risk of loss on these loans would be due to collateral deficiencies due to market deterioration or location and condition of the property and to individual borrower characteristics including borrower income, employment, and the ability to repay the loan. Loans secured by multifamily real estate loans generally involve a greater degree of credit risk than one- to four-family residential mortgage loans and carry larger loan balances. This increased credit risk is a result of several factors, including the concentration of principal in a limited number of loans and borrowers, the effects of general economic conditions on income producing properties, and the increased difficulty of evaluating and monitoring these types of loans. Furthermore, the repayment of loans secured by multifamily mortgages typically depends upon the successful operation of the related real estate property. If the cash flow from the project is reduced, the borrower's ability to repay the loan may be impaired.

Commercial business loans involve a higher risk of default than residential loans of like duration since their repayment generally depends on the successful operation of the borrower's business and the sufficiency of collateral, if any.

For homogeneous loan pools, such as one-to-four family residential mortgages, home equity lines of credit and consumer loans, the Bank uses payment status to identify the credit risk in these loan portfolios. Payment status is reviewed on a monthly basis by the Bank's collection area and on a quarterly basis with respect to determining the adequacy of the allowance for loan losses. The payment status of these homogeneous pools at December 31, 2014, is included in the aging of the recorded investment of past due loans table. In addition, the total nonperforming portion of these homogeneous loan pools at December 31, 2014 and 2013, are presented in the recorded investment in nonaccrual loans table, which is presented in footnote 3.

Troubled debt restructurings are separately identified for impairment disclosures and are measured at the present value of estimated future cash flows using the loan's effective rate at inception. If a troubled debt restructuring is considered to be a collateral dependent loan, the loan is reported, net, at the fair value of the collateral. For troubled debt restructurings that subsequently default, the Bank determines the amount of reserve in accordance with the accounting policy for the allowance for loan losses.

A loan is considered impaired when, based on current information and events, it is probable that the Bank will be unable to collect the scheduled payments of principal or interest when due according to the contractual terms of the loan agreement. Factors considered by management in determining impairment include payment status, collateral value and the probability of collecting scheduled principal and interest payments when due. Loans that experience insignificant payment delays and payment shortfalls generally are not classified as impaired. Management determines the significance of payment delays and payment shortfalls on a case-by-case basis, taking into consideration all of the circumstances surrounding the loan and the borrower, including the length of the delay, the reasons for the delay, the borrower's prior payment record, and the amount of the shortfall in relation to the principal and interest owed. Impairment is measured on a loan by loan basis by either the present value of expected future cash flows discounted at the loan's effective interest rate, the loan's obtainable market price, or the fair value of the collateral if the loan is collateral dependent. Large groups of smaller balance homogeneous loans are collectively evaluated for impairment. Accordingly, the Bank does not separately identify individual consumer and residential loans for impairment disclosures. Loans for which the terms have been modified resulting in a concession, and for which the borrower is experiencing financial difficulties, are considered troubled debt restructurings and classified as impaired.

Premises and Equipment: Premises and equipment are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation and amortization. Depreciation is charged to operations using the straight-line method based upon the estimated useful lives of the assets. Amortization is charged over the lease term or over the estimated useful life of the assets, whichever is shorter. Maintenance and repairs are expensed as incurred while major additions and improvements are capitalized. Gains and losses on dispositions are reflected in current operations.

Restricted Investments in Bank Stock: Restricted investments in bank stock include the Federal Reserve Bank ("FRB"), the Federal Home Loan Bank of New York ("FHLBNY"), Atlantic Central Bankers Bank and The Independent Bankers Bank. The purchase of such shares is limited to member institutions with federal law requiring members to own FRB and FHLBNY stock at a predetermined formula. The stocks are carried at cost, classified as restricted securities, and periodically evaluated for impairment based on ultimate recovery at par value. Both cash and stock dividends are reported as income.

Advertising, Marketing and Business Development Costs: Advertising, marketing and business development costs are charged to operations in the year incurred. Advertising expense was approximately \$372,000 and \$596,000 for the years ended December 31, 2014 and 2013, respectively.

Transfers of Financial Assets: Transfers of financial assets, including loan participation sales, are accounted for as sales, when control over the assets has been surrendered. Control over transferred assets is deemed to be surrendered when (1) the assets have been isolated from the Bank, (2) the transferee obtains the right (free of conditions that constrain it from taking advantage of that right) to pledge or exchange the transferred assets and (3) the Bank does not maintain effective control over the transferred assets through an agreement to repurchase them before their maturity.

Income Taxes: Income taxes are accounted for under the asset and liability method. Current income taxes are provided for based upon the amounts estimated to be currently payable, for both federal and state income taxes. Deferred federal and state tax assets and liabilities are recognized for the expected future tax consequences of existing differences between financial statement and tax bases of existing assets and liabilities. Deferred tax assets are recognized for future deductible temporary differences and tax loss carryforwards. The realization of deferred tax assets is assessed and a valuation allowance is provided for the amount more likely than not expected to not be realized. The effect of a change in the tax rate on deferred taxes is recognized in the period of the enactment date.

The Bank's policy is to recognize interest and penalties on unrecognized tax benefits in income tax expense in the Statements of Operations.

A tax position is recognized as a benefit only if it is "more likely than not" that the tax position would be sustained in a tax examination, with a tax examination being presumed to occur. The amount recognized is the largest amount of tax benefit that is greater than 50% likely of being realized on examination. For tax positions not meeting the "more likely than not" test, no tax benefit is recorded.

Stock Based Compensation: Compensation cost is recognized for restricted stock awards issued based on the fair value of these awards at the date of grant. The market price of the Bank's common stock at the date of grant is used as the fair value of the restricted stock awards. Compensation cost is recognized over the required service period, generally defined as the vesting period. For awards with graded vesting, compensation cost is recognized on a straight-line basis over the requisite service period for the entire award.

Earnings Per Share: Basic earnings per common share is net income divided by the weighted average number of common shares outstanding during the period. All outstanding unvested share-based payment awards that contain rights to nonforfeitable dividends are considered participating securities for this calculation. Diluted earnings per common share includes the dilutive effect of additional potential common shares issuable under stock options, if any.

Comprehensive Income (Loss): Accounting principles generally require that recognized revenue, expenses, gains and losses be included in net income. Changes in certain assets and liabilities, such as unrealized gains (losses) on securities available for sale, are reported as a separate component of the equity section of the statement of financial condition. Such items, along with net income, are components of comprehensive income (loss).

Off-Balance-Sheet Financial Instruments: In the ordinary course of business, the Bank has entered into off-balance-sheet financial instruments consisting of commitments to extend credit and standby letters of credit. Such financial instruments are recorded in the financial statements when they are funded.

At December 31, 2014, unrealized losses involved twenty-one U.S. Government agency securities, four corporate bonds, six MBSs, fifteen CMOs, four obligations of state and political subdivisions, and one asset-backed security. At December 31, 2013, unrealized losses involved thirteen U.S. Government agency securities, two corporate bonds, six MBSs, twenty-one CMOs, twenty-two obligations of state and political subdivisions, and one asset-backed security. Management does not believe that any individual unrealized loss represents an other-than-temporary impairment (“OTTI”).

Management considers many factors including the severity and duration of the impairment; the intent and the ability of the Bank to hold the security for a period of time sufficient for a recovery in value; recent events specific to the issuer or industry; and for debt securities, external credit ratings and recent downgrades. When OTTI occurs, for debt securities, the amount of the OTTI recognized in earnings depends on whether an entity intends to sell the security or it is more likely than not it will be required to sell the security before recovery of its amortized cost basis, less any current period credit loss.

If an entity intends to sell or it is more likely than not it will be required to sell the security before recovery of its amortized cost basis, less any current-period credit loss, the OTTI shall be recognized in earnings equal to the entire difference between the investment’s amortized cost basis and its fair value at the balance sheet date.

If an entity does not intend to sell the security and it is not more likely than not that the entity will be required to sell the security before recovery of its amortized cost basis less any current-period loss, the OTTI shall be separated into the amount representing the credit loss and the amount related to all other factors. The amount of the total OTTI related to the credit loss is determined based on the present value of cash flows expected to be collected and is recognized in earnings. The amount of the total OTTI related to other factors is recognized in other comprehensive income, net of applicable taxes. The previous amortized cost basis less the OTTI recognized in earnings becomes the new amortized cost basis of the investment.

At December 31, 2014 and 2013, management believes that all unrealized losses are due to changes in market interest rates and not related to the underlying credit quality of the issuer of the securities. Management does not intend to sell nor is it more likely than not that management would be required to sell the securities prior to their anticipated recovery. At December 31, 2014 and 2013, all securities in an unrealized loss position are investment grade.

Troubled Debt Restructurings

The Bank has no specific reserves allocated to customers whose loan terms have been modified in troubled debt restructurings as of December 31, 2014. The Bank had \$299,000 of specific reserves allocated to customers whose loan terms have been modified in troubled debt restructurings as of December 31, 2013. The Bank has no commitments to lend additional amounts as of December 31, 2014 and 2013, to customers with outstanding loans that are classified as troubled debt restructurings.

During the years ending December 31, 2014 and 2013, the terms of certain loans were modified as troubled debt restructurings. The modification of the terms of such loans included one or a combination of the following: a reduction of the stated interest rate of the loan; an extension of the maturity date at a stated rate of interest lower than the current market rate for new debt with similar risk; or a permanent reduction of the recorded investment in the loan.

The terms of certain other loans were modified during the years ending December 31, 2014 and 2013 that did not meet the definition of a troubled debt restructuring. These loans have a total recorded investment as of December 31, 2014 and 2013, of \$3,788,000 and \$7,968,000, respectively. The modification of these loans involved rate adjustments for loans to borrowers who were not experiencing financial difficulties.

In order to determine whether a borrower is experiencing financial difficulty, an evaluation is performed of the probability that the borrower will be in payment default on any of its debt in the foreseeable future without the modification. This evaluation is performed under the Bank's internal underwriting policy.

Credit Quality Indicators

The Bank categorizes loans into risk categories based on relevant information about the ability of borrowers to service their debt such as: current financial information, historical payment experience, credit documentation, public information, and current economic trends, among other factors. All loans are classified at origination. The Bank analyzes loans individually by classifying the loans as to credit risk. This analysis includes loans with an outstanding balance greater than \$100,000 and non-homogeneous loans, such as commercial and commercial real estate loans. Subsequent to origination the Bank monitors the loans based on performance. This analysis is performed on a quarterly basis. The Bank uses the following definitions for risk ratings:

Special Mention: Loans classified as special mention have a potential weakness that deserves management's close attention. If left uncorrected, these potential weaknesses may result in deterioration of the repayment prospects for the loan or of the institution's credit position at some future date.

Substandard: Loans classified as substandard are inadequately protected by the current net worth and paying capacity of the obligor or of the collateral pledged, if any. Loans so classified have a well-defined weakness or weaknesses that jeopardize the liquidation of the debt. They are characterized by the distinct possibility that the institution will sustain some loss if the deficiencies are not corrected.

Doubtful: Loans classified as doubtful have all the weaknesses inherent in those classified as substandard, with the added characteristic that the weaknesses make collection or liquidation in full, on the basis of currently existing facts, conditions, and values, highly questionable and improbable.

Loans not meeting the criteria above that are analyzed individually as part of the above described process or are monitored based on performance are considered to be pass rated loans.

NOTE 6 – BORROWINGS AND LINES OF CREDIT

On March 7, 2007, the Bank entered into a \$5,000,000 Master Repurchase Agreement with PNC Bank. The borrowing is at a fixed rate of interest of 4.04% with a maturity date of March 13, 2017. For 2014, the maximum balance of the PNC borrowings was \$5,000,000 and the average balance was \$5,000,000. PNC Bank has the right to terminate the transaction on March 13, 2008, and quarterly thereafter with five business days' notice. The borrowing is collateralized by securities with a carrying amount of \$6,001,000 and fair value of \$5,971,000 as of December 31, 2014.

At December 31, 2014, the Bank had long-term repurchase agreements and amortizing advances with the Federal Home Loan Bank of New York of \$27,313,000 at a weighted average interest rate of 1.84%. For 2014, the maximum balance of the Federal Home Loan Bank New York borrowings was \$27,313,000 and the average balance was \$23,613,000. These long-term borrowings were collateralized by securities with an aggregate carrying value and estimated fair value of approximately \$38,580,000 and \$38,671,000, respectively. The Bank also had \$58,924,000 in pledged loans available to collateralize borrowings.

At December 31, 2013, the Bank had long-term repurchase agreements and amortizing advances with the Federal Home Loan Bank of New York of \$22,667,000 at a weighted average interest rate of 1.81%. For 2013, the maximum balance of the Federal Home Loan Bank New York borrowings was \$22,667,000 and the average balance was \$18,108,000. These long-term borrowings were collateralized by securities with an aggregate carrying value and estimated fair value of approximately \$28,804,000 and \$28,442,000, respectively.

In 2014, New York State enacted comprehensive tax reform provisions with significant impact on financial institutions. As a result of this legislation, beginning in 2015, the Bank will calculate its tax obligation to New York based upon the largest of a calculated income tax liability, a tax liability based upon average equity capital or a fixed minimum fee. Also, effective January 1, 2015, banks under \$8 billion in total assets are permitted to claim a subtraction from New York taxable income equal to 50% of the net interest income on certain loans to customers within New York State, provided the principal balance of these loans is less than \$5 million. Based upon the forecasted impact of this exclusion on the Bank's state taxable income, it is more likely than not the Bank will generate New York losses in future years and therefore calculate its New York tax liability on the basis of average equity capital or a fixed minimum fee. Consequently, the Bank recorded a valuation allowance against its net New York deferred tax assets as of December 31, 2014, as it is unlikely this deferred tax asset will impact the Bank's New York tax liability in future years.

Realization of deferred tax assets associated with the net operating loss carryforwards is dependent upon generating sufficient taxable income prior to their expiration.

At December 31, 2014, the Bank assessed its earnings history and trend over the past three years, its estimate of future earnings, and the expiration dates of its net operating loss carryforwards. This assessment included an analysis of the impact of the Internal Revenue Code (IRC) Section 382 limitations on loss utilization, which amounts to \$354,138 per year. Based on this assessment, the Bank determined that it was more likely than not that its federal deferred tax assets will be realized before their expiration.

At December 31, 2014 and 2013, the Bank had no unrecognized tax benefits recorded. The Bank does not expect the amount of unrecognized tax benefits to significantly change within the next twelve months. There were no penalties or interest related to income taxes recorded in the income statement for the years ended December 31, 2014 and 2013, and no amounts accrued for penalties as of December 31, 2014 and 2013.

The Bank is subject to U.S. federal income tax as well as income tax of the State of New York. The Bank is no longer subject to examination by taxing authorities for the years prior to 2011.

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NOTE 9 – RETIREMENT PLAN

The Bank has established a 401(k) Plan (the “Plan”) to provide retirement benefits for its employees. The Plan covers substantially all employees meeting certain eligibility requirements. Employees may contribute from 1% to 15% of their annual compensation to the Plan, limited to a maximum annual amount as set periodically by the Internal Revenue Service. Contributions that the Bank may make, including matching contributions, are discretionary. In 2014 and 2013, the Bank’s matching contributions totaled approximately \$22,000 and \$28,000, respectively.

NOTE 10 – CAPITAL REQUIREMENTS

The Bank is subject to various regulatory capital requirements administered by the federal banking agencies. Failure to meet minimum capital requirements can initiate certain mandatory, and possibly additional discretionary actions by regulators that, if undertaken, could have a direct material effect on the Bank’s financial statements. Under capital adequacy guidelines and the regulatory framework for prompt corrective action, the Bank must meet specific capital guidelines that involve quantitative measures of the assets, liabilities and certain off-balance-sheet items as calculated under regulatory accounting practices. The capital amounts and classification are also subject to qualitative judgments by the regulators about components, risk-weighting and other factors. Management believes as of December 31, 2014, the Bank meets all capital adequacy requirements to which it is subject.

Quantitative measures established by regulation to ensure capital adequacy require the maintenance of minimum amounts and ratios (set forth in the tables below) of total and Tier 1 capital (as defined in the regulations) to risk-weighted assets (as defined), and of Tier 1 Capital (as defined) to average assets (as defined).

At year end December 31, 2014 and 2013, the most recent notifications from the OCC categorized the Bank as well capitalized under the regulatory framework for prompt correction action. To be categorized as well capitalized, the Bank must maintain minimum total risk-based, Tier 1 risk-based and Tier 1 leverage ratios as set forth in the table below. There are no conditions or events since that notification that management believes have changed the Bank’s category.

NOTE 11 – SHAREHOLDERS' EQUITY AND DIVIDENDS

The OCC regulates the amount of dividends and other capital distributions that the Bank may pay to shareholders. In general, all dividends may only be paid from undivided profits and the Bank must meet all capital requirements after the dividend payment. As of December 31, 2014, the Bank met regulatory guidelines necessary to pay dividends. Net income available to pay dividends totaled \$5,204,000 as of December 31, 2014 with the maximum allowable dividend under regulatory guidelines equal to the Bank's retained earnings of \$3,723,000.

In 2014, a dividend in the amount \$0.05 per share was paid to shareholders of record as of December 10, 2014, on December 23, 2014. In 2013, a dividend in the amount \$0.05 per share was paid to shareholders of record as of December 10, 2013, on December 23, 2013.

NOTE 12 – RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

Loans to principal officers, directors, significant stockholders, and their affiliates at December 31, 2014, were \$5,596,000, of which \$3,756,000 was outstanding and \$1,840,000 was in unused lines of credit. Loans to principal officers, directors, significant stockholders, and their affiliates at December 31, 2013, were \$8,650,000, of which \$6,150,000 was outstanding and \$2,500,000 was in unused lines of credit.

In 2013, the Bank purchased a \$2,975,000 land loan from a director of the Bank, which included the full guarantee of the director. The loan was paid in full during 2014.

The Bank held related party deposits of approximately \$12,117,000 and \$14,734,000 at December 31, 2014 and 2013, respectively.

The Bank leases both the Bardonia and Monroe, New York, branches and office space from significant stockholders of the Bank. For Bardonia, the Bank is committed to an escalating branch and office lease amount beginning at approximately \$134,000 per year and ending at approximately \$175,000 per year through the term of the lease ending August 2018. For Monroe, the Bank is committed to a branch and office lease amount of approximately \$91,000 per year through the term of the leases ending January and February, 2017, respectively. The rent expense for the Bardonia lease amounted to \$155,000 for the years ended December 31, 2014 and 2013. The rent expense for the Monroe leases amounted to \$91,000 for the years ended December 31, 2014 and 2013.

NOTE 13 – FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS WITH OFF-BALANCE-SHEET RISK

The Bank is a party to certain financial instruments with off-balance-sheet risk in the normal course of business to meet the financing needs of its customers. These financial instruments include commitments to extend credit. Those instruments involve, to varying degrees, elements of credit risk in excess of the amount recognized on the statement of financial condition. The contract amounts of those instruments reflect the extent of involvement the Bank has in particular classes of financial instruments. Commitments may expire without being used.

The Bank's exposure to credit loss in the event of nonperformance by the other party to the commitments to extend credit is represented by the contractual notional amount of those instruments. The Bank uses the same credit policies in making commitments as it does for on-balance-sheet instruments. Unless otherwise noted, the Bank may require collateral or other security to support off-balance-sheet financial instruments with credit risk.

NOTE 14 – STOCK BASED COMPENSATION

Share Award Plan: On April 8, 2014 a grant of 12,500 shares of restricted stock was made to employees of the Bank. On February 21, 2013 a grant of 8,950 shares of restricted stock was made to employees of the Bank. On October 4, 2013, a grant of 10,000 shares of restricted stock was made to one executive. On December 3, 2012, a grant of 1,500 shares was made to one executive and on February 17, 2011, a grant of 16,675 shares of restricted stock was made to employees of the Bank. All shares vest over five years. These grants were issued from treasury stock, if available. If treasury stock was unavailable, the grants were issued from authorized and unissued shares. Compensation expense is recognized over the vesting period of the awards based on the fair value of the stock at issue date. NOTE 15 – FAIR VALUE

Fair value is the exchange price that would be received for an asset or paid to transfer a liability (exit price) in the principal or most advantageous market for the asset or liability in an orderly transaction between market participants on the measurement date. There are three levels of inputs that may be used to measure fair values:

Level 1: Quoted prices (unadjusted) for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the entity has the ability to access as of the measurement date.

Level 2: Significant other observable inputs other than Level 1 prices such as quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities; quoted prices in markets that are not active; or other inputs that are observable or can be corroborated by observable market data.

Level 3: Significant unobservable inputs that reflect a reporting entity's own assumptions about the assumptions that market participants would use in pricing an asset or liability.

The fair values for investment securities are determined by quoted market prices, if available (Level 1). For securities where quoted prices are not available, fair values are calculated based on market prices of similar securities (Level 2). For securities where quoted prices or market prices of similar securities are not available, fair values are calculated using discounted cash flows or other market indicators (Level 3).

The fair value of impaired loans with specific allocations of the allowance for loan losses is generally based on recent real estate appraisals. These appraisals may utilize a single valuation approach or a combination of approaches including comparable sales and the income approach. Adjustments are routinely made in the appraisal process by the appraisers to adjust for differences between the comparable sales and income data available. Such adjustments are typically significant and result in a Level 3 classification of the inputs for determining fair value. Because the Bank has a small amount of impaired loans measured at fair value, the impact of unobservable inputs on the Bank's financial statements is not material.

Nonrecurring adjustments to certain commercial and residential real estate properties classified as other real estate owned ("OREO") are measured at lower of cost or fair value, less costs to sell. Fair values are based on recent real estate appraisals. These appraisals may use a single valuation approach or a combination of approaches including comparable sales and the income approach. Adjustments are routinely made in the appraisal process by the independent appraisers to adjust for differences between the comparable sales and income data available. Such adjustments are usually significant and typically result in a Level 3 classification of the inputs for determining fair value.

The methods and assumptions used to estimate fair value are described as follows:

Cash and Cash Equivalents: The carrying amounts of cash and cash equivalents approximate fair values and are classified as Level 1.

Restricted Investments in Bank Stock: It is not practical to determine the fair value of these stocks due to restrictions placed on transferability.

Loans: Fair values of loans are estimated as follows: For variable rate loans that reprice frequently and with no significant change in credit risk, fair values are based on carrying values resulting in a Level 3 classification. Fair values for other loans are estimated using discounted cash flow analyses, using interest rates currently being offered for loans with similar terms to borrowers of similar credit quality resulting in a Level 3 classification. Impaired loans are valued at the lower of cost or fair value as described previously. The methods utilized to estimate the fair value of loans do not necessarily represent an exit price.

Deposits: The fair values disclosed for demand deposits (e.g., interest and non-interest checking, passbook savings, and certain types of money market accounts) are, by definition, equal to the amount payable on demand at the reporting date (i.e., their carrying amount) resulting in a Level 1 classification. The carrying amounts of variable rate, fixed-term money market accounts approximate their fair values at the reporting date resulting in a Level 1 classification. Fair values for certificates of deposit are estimated using a discounted cash flows calculation that applies interest rates currently being offered on certificates to a schedule of aggregated expected monthly maturities on time deposits resulting in a Level 2 classification.

Short-Term Borrowings: The carrying amounts borrowings under repurchase agreements, and other short-term borrowings, generally maturing within ninety days, approximate their fair values resulting in a Level 2 classification.

FHLB Advances: The fair values of the Company's FHLB advances are estimated using discounted cash flow analyses based on the current borrowing rates for similar types of borrowing arrangements resulting in a Level 2 classification.

Accrued Interest Receivable/Payable: The carrying amounts of accrued interest approximate fair value resulting in a Level 1 or Level 2 classification consistent with the classification of the related asset or liability.

Off-balance Sheet Instruments: Fair values for off-balance sheet, credit-related financial instruments are based on fees currently charged to enter into similar agreements, taking into account the remaining terms of the agreements and the counterparties' credit standing. The fair value of commitments is not material.
