American Mobile Dental Corp. (previously known as “tradepubz.com, Inc.”) was formed by the filing of Articles of Incorporation with the Secretary of State of Nevada on July 16, 2004. AMBD is a Nevada corporation.

American Mobile Dental Corp. (previously known as "tradepubz.com, Inc.") was formed by the filing of Articles of Incorporation with the Secretary of State of Nevada on July 16, 2004. On July 25, 2000, tradepubz.com, Inc. was formed by filing Articles of Incorporation with the State of Colorado. On August 2, 2004, tradepubz.com, Inc., a Colorado corporation ("tradepubz Colorado") merged into tradepubz.com, Inc., a Nevada corporation ("tradepubz Nevada") for purposes of effecting a change in domicile only, leaving tradepubz Nevada as the survivor. On September 1, 2004, pursuant to a Certificate of Amendment filed with the Secretary of State of Nevada, tradepubz Nevada changed its legal name to "American Mobile Dental Corp."

The fiscal year end date is June 30.

Neither the Company nor any of its predecessors have ever filed for bankruptcy protection, receivership or any similar proceeding.

American Mobile Dental Corp. (previously known as "tradepubz.com, Inc." a Colorado corporation) merged with tradepubz.com, Inc., a Nevada corporation, effective August 2, 2004, whereby AMBD remained the survivor.

Upon the resignations of Dorothy Mortenson and JP Beehner, the founding directors, Charles D. Randolph, Theodore D. Randolph and Moshe Lifshitz were duly elected as Directors of the Company.

AMBD effected a 65-1 forward stock split effective September 1, 2004, resulting in 406,250,000 shares of issued and outstanding stock. On August 24, 2004 tradepubz.com Inc. acquired 100% of the shares of American Mobile Dental Corp. in exchange for 450,000,000 shares of restricted common stock.

AMBD effected a 65-1 forward stock split effective September 1, 2004, resulting in 406,250,000 shares of issued and outstanding stock. On August 24, 2004 tradepubz.com Inc. acquired 100% of the shares of American Mobile Dental Corp. in exchange for 450,000,000 shares of restricted common stock.

AMBD's securities have not been de-listed and are not in the process of being de-listed by the Securities and Exchange Commission or NASD.

None. There are no known or threatened, past or pending legal proceedings or administrative actions either by or against the Issuer.

**B. BUSINESS OF ISSUER:**

The Issuer manages mobile dental clinics in underserved areas of New York state.

The necessity for sensible oral health is a recognized and acknowledge essential component in our culture. Particular importance is directed to low income and impoverished populations, which do not enjoy a profusion of adequate dental facilities. This problem is manifested further in communities with high ration of pediatric populations. The New York States Dental Association, The American Dental Association and the Surgeon General's report on oral health are united in their endeavor to pursue an all-inclusive widespread program on oral healthcare and hygiene.

The goal of AMBD is to broaden the range of resources available to regions that suffer the undersupply of good dental professional and the facilities in which they practice. AMBD will embark upon an innovative and aggressive program to improve the accessibility of mobile dentistry during extended weekday evening hours and Saturdays to accommodate the diversity in work and school schedules. Further, particular emphasis will be placed on setting a presence at inner-city housing developments, places of assembly in rural communities, in schools and in shopping malls.

Partnerships are being effected with various public health insurance agencies, corporations, parent organizations, schools, the Headstart program and local businesses with an effort placed in critical areas as identified by the federal government in conjunction with principals associated with low-income regions and economic development zones, who will provide for the classification of the need for dental service in those communities.

AMBD forecasts the treatment of not less than 20 patients daily per mobile unit. This plan places several mobile units throughout tactically established locations in New York State.

AMBD will develop a quality management and distribution of a preventive and primary oral health service accessible to low income

regions with particular concentration on communities inhabited by preschool and school-aged children. Dental service providers will be contracted to deliver the business plan through dentistry in AMBD.PK financed equipment and mobile units. The plan will participate in Medicaid opportunities through programs such as Headstart and SCHIPS. American Mobile Dental will function through the implementation of customized mobile coaches, which will be equipped with 1-3 dental operatory stations and associated apparatus and will be placed in underserved areas of New York State as classified by the federal government. These federally designated regions will be overlaid with a register of Headstart organizations, which are presently providing dental services for pediatrics in the 11 counties in western New York State. In addition, public awareness of the American Mobile Dental will be affected through public information networks, including Headstart programs, schools, interfaith service groups, community housing service organizations and county dissemination programs.

Each dental vehicle will administer to patients daily Monday through Saturday and will employ a team of professionals comprising 2 dentists, and a driver/assistant in each of the vans. Each free-standing clinic will also employ a full staff of dentists, hygienists, assistants and receptionists. Headquarters has been established in Mamaroneck, New York where a central computer system will be stationed to network with remote computers in each dental unit for the purposes of filing claims with New York State Medicaid Division. The Mamaroneck site will employ several executive, administrative, and secretarial personnel as outlined in the corporate organization charts. The company anticipates creating 50 plus jobs over the next 3 years.

Through AMBD, Dr. Charles D. Randolph will supervise each dental facility. Dr. Randolph will be responsible for the development and administration of a dental healthcare program. All vans, free-standing clinics, and the equipment will be owned and operated by American Mobile Dental, Corp. Dr. Randolph, the CEO and Health Management Director of AMBD, will maintain the position of managing member of American Mobile Dental, responsible for the overall health plan and the credentialing of dentists and dental hygienists who desire to deliver their dentistry through American Mobile Dental.

State and local authorities were contacted to discuss various rules and regulations regarding requirements associated with the mobile unit enterprise. AMBD has addressed and met all relevant standards.

Various vehicle designs and sizes were identified and examined to achieve an effective and efficient delivery of oral health services. The primary considerations in the design were simplicity of service,

conformity with all New York State and local regulations, compliance with appropriate standards to protect all persons from potential radiation and infectious sources, access for the disabled, and aesthetics and comfort for the employees and the patients.

Digital radiography is foreseen as the imaging system to be utilized to eliminate a dark room, storage, transport and processing of chemicals in the mobile unit. Further, digital radiography permits communication and interface between the van and the home station at AMBD headquarters. This form of radiography is also the safest for the patient and clinician. The digital system uses 1/10 of the amount of radiation.

The core business strategy of AMBD is the provision of preventive and maintenance services in oral health care. However, more significant and complex oral health procedures and treatments will be identified through x-rays and visual inspection. It is anticipated that all of these procedures will be carried out in our free-standing clinics for purposes of referral of patients who have consulted with AMBD. No income projections are presented for these facilities due to the fact that there is no way to accurately estimate what types of dentistry will be performed, and the fees for such procedures are all very different.

OSHA recommendations for post-exposure management will be followed. However, when a van is in transit, consideration will be given to the location of the nearest hospital which will be contacted, in advance, to ascertain its willingness to provide post-exposure consultation to patients of AMBD. Similarly, copies of relevant documents such as hot-line telephone numbers, OSHA blood-borne packaging standard and the school being visited being occupational exposure protocol will be procured. All necessary paperwork, such as HIV test consent forms, incident reporting forms will be readily available through home based computer management.

The mobile unit vehicles will inevitably require both preventive and corrective technical and mechanical maintenance. While routine and preventive maintenance may be performed in-house or by outside vendors, a vigilant maintenance schedule will be established to avoid costly corrective service that would result in a hiatus during which the vehicle will experience a disruption in operation. Typical primary areas of concern experienced by other mobile unit operations have included the vehicle chassis system, vehicle body, air conditioning system, generator, stabilization jack system and entry step system.

Suitable vehicle maintenance facilities will be acquired for purposes of vehicle storage overnight and at times during which the vehicle is not in operation. Appropriate accommodations for parking, turning, and

clearance will be provided, and an external power source for safeguarding the continued supply of refrigeration and heat will be installed. On-board water systems which supply water and drainage for tanks are required and will exist at vehicle maintenance areas.

An additional phase under consideration is the dental needs of residents of the nursing and long-term care facilities throughout New York State. This underserved senior population also presents a significant problem in the delivery of oral health in New York State. Contract negotiations are underway between AMBD and those providing care to these aged populations.

**4. *Effect of the existing or probable governmental regulations on the business;***

*New York State Department of Health (NYSDOH)*

The NYSDOH requires any Article 28 health facility requesting an amendment of its operating certificate to undergo an administrative review and file a Certificate of Need application (Article 28 New York State Public Health Law (1966) Diagnostic Treatment Facilities; Health Rules & Regulations 10 NYCRR 710.1(c)). This application must be completed and returned to the state with a \$1,000 processing fee. Upon receipt of the application by the state, copies are distributed to various reviewing units. The application includes a project narrative, total project costs, plans for financing, annual operating costs, annual operating revenues, architectural submission letter,

staffing, assurances, and services requiring certification. The mandatory review of the project for public need, financial feasibility, character, and competence determines if the proposal is approved. It is recommended that prior to entering into contractual commitments or commencing construction, the final approval of the Director of the Office of Health Systems Management be obtained. In the case of the college, the van is considered to be an addition of a part time clinic.

*NYSDOH Bureau for Environmental Radiation Protection*

In the state of New York, the dental x-ray equipment must be inspected and registered by this agency. The license must be renewed every two years.

*Bureau of Radiological Health of the NYC Department of Health*

The city of New York requires the inspection and registration of dental x-ray equipment before it is used. The license is renewable every two years.

*New York City Department of Transportation (NYCDOT)*

The NYCDOT Traffic Rules and Vehicle Sizes places limitations on the dimensions and weight of oversized vehicles in New York City and are defined in the Table below. No vehicle may be operated over, on or through any bridge, viaduct or other structures on any highway if the weight of such vehicle is greater than the posted capacity of the structure or exceeds the height of the post clearance as shown by an official sign or other marking devices. (Subd.(b)(13)). If desired, an organization can apply for an over-dimensional vehicle permit and be charged a daily fee each time the vehicle is on the road. A daily cost of \$100 was quoted.

*Authorized Parking and Permits Bureau*

The NYCDOT Authorized Parking and Parking Permits Bureau review applications for the annual on street parking permit. This permit is intended to facilitate Not-for-profit organization in their daily performance of duties on New York City streets as specified in Section 4-08(o) of the NYC Traffic Rules. An example is transportation of persons with disabilities.

The bureau requests all pertinent vehicle or transportation documents accompany the application, including a not-for-profit tax exemption letter, registration card, insurance card, license plate number and leasing agreement.

The Issuer has spent a nominal amount of time on research and development and any related cost of such activities will not be borne by its customers.

American Mobile Dental, Corp. is a multi-phased business organization, which provides effective dental and health management services for consumers in dedicated federal economic development areas. This service is made possible through the acquisition of freestanding buildings, which will house dental centers, and mobile dental units.

The first level of income for the business plan is based in Medicaid and therefore Medicaid access and barriers.

The access barriers associated with the Medicaid program have been identified in a number of studies and formats. Barriers may be grouped into four (4) categories:

1. Medicaid policies and administrative procedures
2. Supply and distribution of providers
3. Communicate an understanding among the major players to understand the value of oral health
4. An analysis of each category results in the identification of strategies for making improvements and potential business plan elements for implementation.

AMBD's a business plan which reaches out to the low income areas to make it easier for dentists to obtain reimbursement, use American Mobile

Dental to reduce the cost demands on dentists and decrease cost to patients by bringing dental services to their door.

The Issuer has not yet announced new products or services.

Dr. Randolph was a consultant to the Southern California Center for Cranial Facial Pain, and is a charter member of the American Association for Functional Orthodontics. Dr. Randolph as lectured both nationally and internationally on his work in functional orthodontics (removable braces), and temporomandibular joint (TMJ) syndrome to relieve headaches, neck aches, and facial pain. He also co-hosted a weekly television show called "Your Head and Face."

Theodore D. Randolph is Executive Vice President of American Mobile Dental Corp. Mr. Randolph was formerly the Chief Operating Officer of U.S. Dental, Inc., a dental practice management company. Dear Mr. Beehner & Mrs. Mortenson:

Pursuant to our telephone conversations of earlier today regarding the possible requests for removal of restrictions and stop transfer instructions on the Company's share certificates owned by certain of the Company's shareholders. In response to your request I offer the following opinion.

It is my understanding that some of the Company's shareholders, who own share certificates #5 through #34, may soon request the Company's removal of restrictions on the tradability of their shares. at your request I have reviewed the corporate transfer ledger, Articles of Incorporation, Bylaws, corporate minutes and Subscription Agreements. I have relied upon the validity and truthfulness of these documents and the representations made in the Subscription Agreements signed by each of the individual shareholders owning certificates #5 through #34.

A review of the Stock Transfer Ledger indicates that the above certificates represent fifteen blocks of 200,000 shares each, in the form of one certificate for 2,000 shares and one certificate for 198,000 shares for each of the fifteen shareholders. These shares were all issued to the current shareholders of record pursuant to Corporate Resolution on August 5, 2000. The Company has authorized and issued a total of 6,250,000 shares. These 200,000 share blocks represent 3.2% ownership each.

You have also represented the following regarding each of these individual shareholders.

1. None of them are currently "affiliates" of the Company ( as that term is defined in Rule 144(a)(1)), and have not been an affiliate of the Company during the preceding three months.

2. At least two years have elapsed since the later of the date the shares were acquired from the Company or any affiliate of the Company prior to the date hereof. These shareholders all acquired their shares on August 5, 2000, in exchange for their services to the Company including participation in the creation, development and implementation of a business and marketing plan. The Company and the shareholders considered the consideration paid in full on August 5, 2000. (This applies to each of the above-enumerated certificates.)

Assuming the above facts to be true, and assuming they remain the same, it is my opinion that the shares represented by certificates #5 through #34 would qualify for treatment under Rule 144(k) promulgated under the Securities Act of 1933, as amended. Upon request you should remove the Legends and Stop Transfer Instructions maintained in your records with respect to these certificates and so instruct your Transfer Agent.

**\*NOTE 1 – FORMATION AND NATURE OF BUSINESS**

AMERICAN MOBILE DENTAL COPR., formerly known as Pikes Peakes Acquisition.Com Inc. (the "Company") was formed on July 1, 1999 in Nevada. The company began (Enter in the business information about the company)

**\*NOTE 2 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING PRINCIPLES**

**\*STOCK BASED COMPENSATION**

As permitted by Statement of Financial Accounting Standards ("SFAS") No. 148, "Accounting for Stock-Based Compensation--Transition and Disclosure", which amended SFAS 123 ("SFAS 123"), "Accounting for Stock-Based Compensation", the Company has elected to continue to follow the intrinsic value method in accounting for its stock-based employee compensation arrangements as defined by Accounting Principles Board Opinion ("APB") No. 25, "Accounting for Stock Issued to Employees", and related Interpretations including "Financial Accounting Standards Board Interpretations No. 44, Accounting for Certain Transactions Involving Stock Compensation", and interpretation of APB No. 25. At December 31, 2004 the Company has not formed a Stock Option Plan and has not issued any options.

**\*INCOME TAXES**

The Company accounts for income taxes using the liability method, which requires the determination of deferred tax assets and liabilities based on the differences between the financial and tax bases of assets and liabilities using enacted tax rates in effect for the year in which differences are expected to reverse. Deferred tax assets are adjusted by a valuation allowance, if, based on the weight of available evidence, it is more likely than not that some portion or all of the deferred tax assets will not be realized.

**\*At December 31, 2004, the Company has net operating loss carry forwards of approximately \$14,916, which expire through 2011. Based on this and the fact that the Company has generated operating losses through December 31, 2004, the deferred tax asset of approximately \$7,500 has been offset by a valuation allowance of \$7,500.**

**\*USE OF ESTIMATES IN THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS**

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

**\*EARNINGS PER SHARE**

The Company adopted the provisions of SFAS No. 128, "Earnings per Share." SFAS No. 128 requires the presentation of basic and diluted earnings per share ("EPS"). Basic EPS is computed by dividing income available to common stockholders by the weighted-average number of common shares outstanding for the period. Diluted EPS includes the potential dilution that could occur if options or other contracts to issue common stock were exercised or converted. During the period the year ending December 31, 2004, no options or other contracts to issue common stock were issued or entered into. Accordingly, basic and diluted earnings per share are identical.

**\*RECENTLY ISSUED ACCOUNTING STANDARDS**

Management does not believe that any recently issued but not yet adopted accounting standards will have a material effect on the Company's results of operations or on the reported amounts of its assets and liabilities upon adoption.

**\*NOTE 3 - COMMON STOCK**

The Company has issued and outstanding 850,000,000 shares of its common stock and \$nil additional paid-in capital as of December 31, 2004.
