

# Alternative Reporting Standard: Disclosure Guidelines for the Pink® Market

Federal and state securities laws require issuers to provide *current information* to the public markets. With a view to facilitating compliance with these laws, OTC Markets Group has created these Disclosure Guidelines ("Guidelines")<sup>1</sup> that set forth the disclosure obligations that make up the "Alternative Reporting Standard" for Pink companies. Companies on the Pink Market that do not make disclosure directly to the SEC (via EDGAR), a banking regulator, or a non-U.S. regulatory authority may provide disclosure under our "Alternative Reporting Standard." We use information provided by companies under these Guidelines to designate the appropriate tier in the Pink Market: Current Information or Limited Information.<sup>2</sup>

### **Pink Current Information Tier**

To qualify for the Current Information Tier:

- Subscribe to the OTC Disclosure & News Service: To submit an application, visit <u>Gateway</u> to sign in or create a new account. Allow OTC Markets Group 2-4 weeks to process your application and provide authorized user credentials to OTCIQ.
- 2. **Publish Initial Disclosure**: Upload the following documents through OTCIQ:
  - Annual Report for the most recently completed fiscal year.
  - All Quarterly Reports for the Current Fiscal Year.

Annual or Quarterly Reports are composed of:

- Disclosure Statements: Disclosure information pursuant to these Guidelines for the applicable period.
   Available as a fillable form beginning on page 4 of these Guidelines.
- Financial Statements: Qualifying Financial Statements in accordance with the Financial Statement Requirements specified in Item 9 of these Guidelines.

Qualifying Financial Statements include:

- o Audit Letter, if audited
- o Balance Sheet
- Statement of Income
- Statement of Cash Flows
- Statement of Retained Earnings (Statement of Changes in Stockholders' Equity)
- Notes to Financial Statements
- 3. **Publish the annual Management Certification:** Companies must certify basic company information initially and annually within forty five (45) days of a company's annual report due date.

- 4. Verify Profile: Verify the Company Profile through OTCIQ. This includes the complete list of current officers, directors, and service providers; outstanding shares; a business description; contact information; and the names of all company insiders and beneficial owners of 10% or more of the outstanding units or shares of any class of any equity security of the issuer.
- OTC Markets Group Processing of Reports: Allow OTC Markets Group to process the posted documents (typically three to five business days) and provide any comments. Companies will only be evaluated for Current Information once all required documentation has been submitted.
- Ongoing Requirements: To qualify for Current Information on an ongoing basis, companies must:
  - Publish reports through OTCIQ on the following schedule:
    - o Quarterly Report within 45 days of the quarter end
    - o Annual Report within 90 days of the fiscal year end
  - Complete an annual Management Certification within 45 days of the annual report due date.
  - Maintain a Verified Profile. At least once every six months, review and verify the Company Profile through OTCIQ.
  - Maintain Transfer Agent Verified share data. If your transfer agent participates in the <u>Transfer Agent Verified</u> <u>Shares Program</u>, then your securities must have current share data verified by the transfer agent.
  - Maintain an Active standing in the Company's State of Incorporation.

### **Pink Limited Information Tier**

Companies that do not meet the requirements of the Pink Current Information tier set forth above may still qualify for the Pink Limited Information Tier by meeting the following minimum disclosure requirements.

- 1. **Annual Financial Statements:** Publish one set of Qualifying Annual Financial Statements which cover the past 2 completed fiscal years, provided the most recently completed fiscal year is within the past 16 months.
- 2. **Verified Profile:** The Company must verify the Company Profile through OTCIQ, including, but not limited to, a complete list of officers, directors, and service providers; outstanding shares; a business description; contact information; and the name of all company insiders. "Company Insiders" shall include the beneficial owner of 10% or more of the outstanding units or shares of any class of any equity security of the issuer.
- Ongoing Requirements: To qualify for Limited Information on an ongoing basis, companies must:
  - Publish reports on the following schedule:
    - Annual Financial Statements as outlined in Item 9 within 120 days of the fiscal year end. Should a change in FYE occur, no more than 16 months may elapse from the fiscal year end of the prior Annual Financial Statement.
  - Review and Verify the Company's profile information through OTCIQ at least once every 12 months.
  - Maintain Transfer Agent Verified share data. If your transfer agent participates in the <u>Transfer Agent Verified</u>
     Shares Program, then your securities must have current share data verified by the transfer agent.

### **Current Reporting of Material Corporate Events**

In addition to the disclosure requirements above, all companies on the Pink market are expected to promptly release to the public any news or information regarding corporate events that may be material to the issuer and its securities (including adverse information). Persons with knowledge of such events are considered to be in possession of material

nonpublic information and may not buy or sell the issuer's securities until or unless such information is made public. If not included in the issuer's previous public disclosure documents, or if the material events occurs after the publication of such disclosure documents, the issuer shall publicly disclose such events by disseminating a news release <u>within four (4)</u> <u>business days</u> following their occurrence and posting such news release through an Integrated Newswire or the OTC Disclosure & News Service.<sup>3</sup>

### **BUSINESS OVERVIEW**

Ubiquitech Software Corporation, incorporated in the State of Colorado on January 11, 2007, ("UBQU" or the "Company"), acquired Blue Crush Marketing Group LLC ("BC" or "Blue Crush") in July 2013, and more recently assets of Innovative Outcomes Inc. in March of 2024.

Ubiquitech Software Corp., through its subsidiary Innovative Outcomes, is a leading provider of advanced surgical dressings and AI-powered video tutorials, delivered directly to patients. Our company is dedicated to offering healthcare professionals cutting-edge solutions for patient healing. The wound care market in the United States is expanding significantly, driven by a rise in diabetes, vascular diseases, and cancer diagnoses. Consequently, nearly every medical practice is now involved in treating patients with wounds. Our profitability stems from delivering the most advanced wound care products available, enabling healthcare professionals and their patients to focus on effective healing and maintaining a healthy lifestyle, complemented by exceptional service.

### Note 1 – Nature of Operations and Basis of Presentation

Ubiquitech Software Corporation through our subsidiary Innovative Outcomes, delivers our products directly to patients' homes across the United States, operating similarly to a mail-order pharmacy by fulfilling prescriptions and treatment plans submitted by the patients' treating providers. Our products are packaged in our unique "iPak" unit-dose packaging, designed to reduce consumption, minimize patient confusion, and enhance compliance, ultimately leading to improved outcomes and a positive patient experience. Our focus is patient-centric, empowering patients through educational videos and intuitive, self-explanatory packaging.

### **Products and Services**

Our iPAK (Unit-Dose Packaging) is the cornerstone of our company, and it is meticulously designed to stand out. Developed with patient-centricity at its core, it aims to empower and educate patients, enhancing compliance, reducing confusion, and fostering better outcomes. Each iPAK is customized to meet the specific wound care needs of the patient and includes an AI-generated QR code that provides access to a "How to" video. This feature enables patients to perform better wound care at home, minimizing the need for frequent doctor visits.

At Innovative Outcomes, we are singularly focused on simplifying the patient's role in their own wound care, making it less stressful. Our products and services are uniquely packaged to support this mission.

The accompanying unaudited financial statements of Ubiquitech Software Corp. (the "Company") have been prepared by management in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America for financial information and pursuant to rules and regulations of the Securities and Exchange Commission ("SEC). In the opinion of management, all adjustments considered necessary for a fair presentation have been included.

The results of operations for the period ended May 31, 2025, are not necessarily indicative of future results. The accompanying unaudited financial statements should be read in conjunction with the Company's financial statements and notes related to the year ended November 30, 2024.

# Note 2 - Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

### **Basis of Presentation**

The accompanying financial statements have been prepared in accordance with accountingprinciples generally accepted in the United States of America and the rules of the Securities and Exchange Commission ("SEC"). In the opinion of the management, all adjustments necessary for the financial statements to be not misleading have been reflected herein. The Company has elected a fiscal year ending on November 30.

### Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires the Company to make estimates and judgmentsthat affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities, revenues and expenses, and related disclosures of contingent assets and liabilities. These estimates and judgments are based on historical information, information that is currently available to the Company and on various otherassumptions that the Company believes to be reasonable under the circumstances. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

### Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents consist of cash and short-term investments with original maturities of less than 90 days. Cash equivalents are placed with high credit quality financial institutions and are primarily in money market funds. The carrying value of those investments approximates fair value.

### Property and equipment

Property and equipment are stated at the lower of cost or fair value. Depreciation is provided on astraight-line basis over the estimated useful lives of the assets, currently three years.

The estimated useful lives are based on the nature of the assets as well as current operating strategyand legal considerations such as contractual life. Future events, such as property expansions, property developments, new competition, or new regulations, could result in a change in the manner in which the Company uses certain assets requiring a change in the estimated useful lives of such assets.

### Revenue Recognition

Revenue is only recognized when all of the following criteria are met: (1) persuasive evidence of an arrangement exists, (2) delivery has occurred or services have been rendered, (3) the price to the buyer is fixed or determinable, and (4) collectability is reasonably assured.

### Basic Earnings (Loss) per Share

Basic earnings (loss) per common share is computed by dividing net income (loss) available to common shareholders by the weighted-average number of shares of common stock outstanding during the period. Diluted earnings per common share is computed by dividing income available to common shareholders by the weighted-average number of shares of common stock outstanding during the period increased to include the number of additional shares of common stock that wouldhave been outstanding if potentially dilutive securities had been issued. There were no potentially dilutive securities outstanding during the periods presented.

### **Stock-based Compensation**

The Company accounts for equity-based transactions with non-employees under the provisions of ASC Topic No. 505-50, "Equity-Based Payments to Non-Employees" ("Topic No. 505-50"). Topic No. 505-50 establishes that equity-based payment transactions with non-employees shall be measured at the fair value of the consideration received or the fair value of the equity instrumentsissued, whichever is more reliably measurable. The fair value of common stock issued for payments to non-employees in accordance with ASC Topic 505, "Equity", whereas the value of the stock compensation is based upon the measurement date as determined at either (a) the date atwhich a performance commitment is reached, or (b) at the date at which the necessary performance oearn the equity instrument is complete. The fair value of equity instruments, other than common stock, is estimated using the Black-Scholes option valuation model. In general, the Company recognizes an asset or expense in the same manner as if it was to pay cash for the goods or services instead of paying with or using the equity instrument.

The Company accounts for employee stock-based compensation in accordance with the guidanceof FASB ASC Topic 718, *Compensation - Stock Compensation* which requires all share-based payments to employees, including grants of employee stock options, to be recognized in the financial statements based on their fair values on the grant date. The fair value of the equity instrument is charged directly to compensation expense and credited to additional paid-in capital over the period during which services are rendered. There has been no stock-based compensationissued to employees.

### Fair Value of Financial Instruments

The carrying amount of cash, accounts payable and accrued liabilities, as applicable, approximates fair value due to the short-term nature of these items. The fair value of the related party notes payable cannot be determined because of the Company's affiliation with the parties with whom theagreements exist. The use of different assumptions or methodologies may have a material effect on the estimates of fair values.

ASC Topic 820, "Fair Value Measurements and Disclosures," requires disclosure of the fair valueof financial instruments held by the Company. ASC Topic 825, "Financial Instruments," defines fair value, and establishes a three-level valuation hierarchy for disclosures of fair value measurement that enhances disclosure requirements for fair value measures. The carrying amounts

reported in the balance sheets for receivables and current liabilities each qualify as financial instruments and are a reasonable estimate of their fair values because of the short period of time between the origination of such instruments and their expected realization and their currentmarket rate of interest. The three levels of valuation hierarchy are defined as follows:

- · Level 1: Observable inputs such as quoted prices in active markets.
- · Level 2: Inputs, other than the quoted prices in active markets, that are observable either directly rindirectly; and
- · Level 3: Unobservable inputs in which there is little or no market data, which require thereporting entity to develop its own assumptions.

### Impact of New Accounting Standards

In January 2017, the Financial Accounting Standards Board ("FASB") issued an Accounting Standards Update ("ASU") 2017-01, *Business Combinations (Topic 805) Clarifying the Definition of a Business.* The amendments in this update clarify the definition of a business with the objective adding guidance to assist entities with evaluating whether transactions should be accounted foras acquisitions or disposals of assets or businesses. The definition of a business affects many areas faccounting including acquisitions, disposals, goodwill, and consolidation. The guidance is effective for interim and annual periods beginning after December 15, 2017, and should be applied prospectively on or after the effective date. The Company is in the process of evaluating the impact of this accounting standard update.

These pronouncements did not have any material impact on the financial statements unless otherwise disclosed, and the Company does not believe that there are any other new accounting pronouncements that have been issued that might have a material impact on its financial position  $\sigma$  results of operations.

### **Income Taxes**

Income taxes are computed using the asset and liability method of accounting. Under the asset and liability method, a deferred tax asset or liability is recognized for estimated future tax effects attributable to temporary differences and carry-forwards. The measurement of deferred income taxassets is adjusted by a valuation allowance, if necessary, to recognize future tax benefits only to the extent, based on available evidence; it is more likely than not such benefits will be realized. The Company's deferred tax assets were fully reserved at May 31, 2025.

The Company accounts for its income taxes using the Income Tax topic of the FASB ASC 740, which requires the recognition of deferred tax liabilities and assets for expected future tax consequences of events that have been included in the financial statements or tax returns. Under this method, deferred tax liabilities and assets are determined based on the difference between thefinancial statement and tax bases of assets and liabilities using enacted tax rates in effect for the year in which the differences are expected to reverse.

### Note 3 - Going Concern

These consolidated financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis, which implies the Company will continue to realize its assets and discharge its liabilities in the normal course of business. However, the accompanying financial statements reflect that the Company hasincurred significant operating losses and has a deficit in shareholders' equity. These factors raise substantial doubt regarding the Company's ability to continue as a going concern. The continuation of the Company as a going concern is dependent upon the continued financial supportfrom its shareholders, the ability of the Company to obtain necessary equity financing to continue operations. At May 31, 2025, the Company has accumulated losses of \$4,677,696 since inception. These consolidated financial statements include write off of assets acquired that are no longer useful and have no value.

### Note 4 – Property and Equipment

Property and equipment, stated at cost, less accumulated depreciation at May 31, 2025 totaled \$20,873, and consisted of computer systems and packaging and handling equipment.
